



IN GRATITUDE TO MR. MIKE ROIDE

In this Newsletter, the JRJI Team wants to acknowledge the work of our publisher, Mr. Mike Roide, for all of the support and help he has given us over the years, and especially during the past year and a half during the COVID-19 pandemic. Not being able to travel to the prisons during these months enabled us to spend more time preparing materials and organizing Fr. Mike's meditations into various themes, which resulted in a number of books. But books do not come about by magic. Mr. Mike Roide has formatted and beautifully printed each one. These books will be used for guided meditations during our retreats in the prisons, and as well as for personal reflections for the JRJI participants inside. Mike has graciously published these books without cost to JRJI and we are incredibly grateful to him and his company RGS Inc. Next month, JRJI will be honoring Mr. Roide in a more formal way, but we wanted to share some of the work that Mike has published over the past year and a half of the pandemic, and following the title is a short excerpt from the introduction to each book.

Whose Voice Do I Listen To? (2020)



Returning Home (2020)

"Each play in this book is directed to the person who struggles with the daily life of prison, but who also has an enormous desire to change, to do good, and ultimately to go home. This is a challenge that cannot be met alone, but rather requires the help and support found within a community. These plays speak about this challenge. Our hope for those who will read these plays, and thus enter into the roles found in them, is that they will listen carefully to the messages of healing and forgiveness which are essential for their own inner work. Transformation, inner healing, is possible, and it will show up clearly when they finally do appear before the board. We know this because we have seen it. They are nothing less than miracles of grace."





Mercy (2020)

"Perhaps a simple definition of 'mercy' might be to simply taste the unconditional love of God, not in spite of our failings, but with them. The mercy of God is the felt love of God. When I really can own that I am a good person. Yes, I have done things that have hurt others, but I am a good person.... I welcome you to these meditations on Mercy. Each one will attempt to deepen the message of God's mercy. May we all constantly grow deeper within God's mercy, and help others do the same."



Footprints (2020)

'Footprints is a program that strives to provide spiritual healing by fostering supportive relationships. Footprints equips the participants with the tools needed to recognize the impact of their actions, and it hopes to successfully reintegrate the participants back into the community. Using real-life situations, group sharing, and journaling exercises, Footprints assists participants in understanding the manipulation and destructive influences of their criminal activity. Participants are held responsible and accountable for their past behavior."

Forgiveness (2020)







Trust (2021)


Fr. Mike reflected on being captured by soldiers in El Salvador: "I am grateful that a few days later we were all released. I was soon deported, but I remember getting on the plane, taking off, and looking down at the countryside below. I was grateful that God gave me the sense, and the strength, to trust that small voice that I was hearing. That voice said to me, "Don't be stupid, confront these people." I never got into that car, and I will always remember it as a moment of trust in that small, still voice of God that leads us to life not death. I am grateful for that voice, and grateful that our God whispers to us how to trust Him, when to trust Him, and to trust that He is always with us."






The Oraciones en Tiempos de COVID-19 book is the Spanish version of the book Prayers During Time of COVID-19.


Hope (2021)

CORRESPONDENCE REPORT

We are very moved by the reflections we continue to receive from our sisters and brothers in many institutions in the state of California. All this wisdom is in response to the correspondence that we send out monthly. Many have shared with us that they have obtained a greater approach to God during the pandemic. Through the material we send them, they can heal and forgive all the wounds that have led them to these places. Today, they realize that God was always with them, even though they have made bad decisions. This experience is bringing them closer to God and their families. We are sharing some of their reflections that we have received this month.

WISDOM FROM THE CELLS

Most people, or at least a good majority, would think God had abandoned them. I myself see things from a different perspective now. I know he loves me. I also know he has a plan for me and this "incarceration" is part of that plan! When I can accept that, it makes the lesson I'm being taught more meaningful. After all, life is our teacher and we are being taught constantly. Failure to observe and poor circumspection leads to additional pain, which compounds the problem and one that also adds layers of suffering on top of already existing pain."

"In 2020, the COVID crisis had hit us here. I remember when the first positive came up. I remember the anxiety, the fear I felt. Watching the news didn't help. It would increase the anxiety. As weeks would pass more and more cases were popping up. Hearing that phone ring and seeing the C.O.s walking with a roll of bags mean you were positive. My heart would pump so fast each time that happened. During this time, I was able to get closer to God. As the building got emptier and emptier, I prayed more and more. At one point I was asked to come out and help. I said yeah, but man the anxiety I had was at an all-time high. Luckily nothing happened! Through the grace of God, I was one of the few that didn't test positive in the building. Thank you, Jesus, for being with me."

"When I got to jail, I felt completely lost and alone. I didn't know what to expect. I thought about my mom and dad a lot. They pain they felt was really burning a hole in my heart. Till this day the pain is still there. But with everything God has given me and my family gives me this calmness to my heart. Those days I felt I was going to break, that I was going to be able to handle jail, or whatever comes my way. The message I got from God was that he would never give me a pain or challenge that I can't handle. My mom always had told me the same so those words always help me out."
